2008 Hall of Honor



Robert W. Irish, Jr., discovered his interest in the military while in high school where he attained the rank of Cadet LTC. He attended the University of Texas at Arlington (then Arlington State College) from 1961 to 1966. He was a member of the Pistol Team that in 1962/63 beat the United States Military Academy and went on to be the National Intercollegiate Pistol Champion. At ASC he attained the rank of Cadet Major and served as the Cadet Battalion S3. He was commissioned a Second Lieutenant in the Signal Corps and was assigned to the Army Reserve.

He entered Perkins School of Theology at SMU, graduated in 1969, and was ordained a minister in the United Methodist Church. He was then called to active duty for two years and served in Korea.

Realizing his skills lay more in technology, he resigned his position in the church in 1972 and entered the business world. During the next 32 years, he went from an electronic salesman to heading several large companies. He retired in 1990.

Thinking he was through with business, he found out business was not through with him. He became the CEO of Exchange Data Corporation in 1991, and founded and became CEO of Secure Safes in 1995. He served as Chair of TEC International from 2001-2004. He served as Chief Operating Officer of Controls International from 2004 to present.

As it turned out, the military was not through with him either. In 2004 he was selected by the Secretary of Defense as one of 43 executives to tour military bases in Europe, the Mideast, and Africa where he received high-level briefing on the latest efforts to combat terrorism in sensitive areas of the world. Following his return, he shared his experiences and information received with many organizations.

He continues to serve the United Methodist Church as a lay person at Spring Valley UMC in Dallas. However, the project closest to his heart is the Center for the Advanced Study and Practice of Evangelism at SMU. He is now a member of the Executive Board.

Bob and his wife, Eddy, have two children.



Colonel (Ret) Thomas A. Schneider attended the University of Texas at Arlington and graduated in 1977. He was a member of the Corps of Cadets and performed with the Sam Houston Rifle Drill Team. He served as the Team Commander in 1977 when UTA won the Texas State Championship. He was commissioned a Second Lieutenant in the Ordnance Corps.

Upon completion of the Ordnance Officers Basic Course, Tom went to Fort Greely, AK, and then on to the 9th Infantry Division, where he served as Commander of a Heavy Maintenance Company. The U.S. Army Ordnance Center and School was next. He next served as an Ordnance Advisor in Saudi Arabia. Upon his return to the US, he was assigned to the 4th Infantry Division and then on to Fort Indian-town Gap, PA. His next assignment took him to Europe, where he served in various positions and then as Battalion Commander. In 1998 he was assigned to Task Force Falcon/1st Infantry Division, where he prepared the Task Force for deployment to Kosovo. Promoted to Colonel, his final assignment was that of Commander, United Nations Command (Rear). He was the representative in Japan responsible for interacting with the government of Japan, U.S. Forces in Japan, and embassies of eight UNC member nations. He retired in 2004.

Tom accepted a position as a Senior Logistics Analyst working on the Army's Future Combat Systems (FCS) program. In September 2005, he moved to Kuwait to work for CSA Ltd, and he continues to serve there. He is Director of Maintenance for CSA Ltd and operates two large maintenance shops that provided area support maintenance to units assigned in Kuwait and, more importantly, to units transiting through Kuwait en route to Iraq. He provides a full range of ground maintenance, in all commodities, at the Field Maintenance level (the old Organizational and Direct Support levels) and limited support at the Sustainment level (old General Support and Depot levels).
