I wasn't there yet. But even if I had been there, I would still embellish and fabricate some of the details just like the liberal press does on a regular basis. Some parts of this story come from ASC legends handed down over the years, and part of this story comes from one of the actual players.

We have all heard the expression: *Fools' names and fools' faces always appear in public places.* The way you work around that is to put someone else's name in a public place.

I'm no stranger to painting *Highland Park Seniors 1961* on the local water tower. I still have the citation that reads, "Violation of the Water Tower Ordinance," to prove it. Now that the statute of limitations has run its course, there is more to confess.

You may recall the two Military Science Buildings across from Davis Hall. Probably built when Roosevelt was president—most likely Teddy. They were up on piers and beams, but the wood siding came all the way to the ground level. This made the windows appear much higher up the side of the building—it appeared to look like a prison compound at a concentration camp. Well, Scott Leidolf, Mike Ellis, and I reasoned that it only needed a final touch to complete the look. A stencil that read "STALAG 17" was fabricated, and at about 2 a.m. the look was complete. The actual painting took only a

Hall of Honor Candidates 2009

Joe Lopez



SGM Joe Lopez will be inducted as an Associate Member of the Hall of Honor in recognition of his outstanding service to the Military Science Department at UTA, as the Senior Military Instructor during his two tours in 1977 and 1985.

Joe "China Boy" Lopez joined the Army in 1955. He received his airborne training and was subsequently assigned to the 11th Airborne Division in Germany and the 101st Airborne Division at Fort Campbell. During the Cuban Crisis of 1960, Joe joined the 7th Special Forces Group. He subsequently served with the Special Forces in Panama and two tours in Viet Nam.

SGM Lopez is a graduate of the Sergeant Majors Academy at Ft. Bliss. Assignments followed with the 10th Special Forces Group at Fort Devens, then in Panama, and Fifth Army HQ with duty at Camp Mabry with the Texas ARNG.

His countless awards and honors include the Silver Star, Legion of Merit, 3 Bronze Stars for Valor, Purple Heart, Master Parachutist Wings, CIB and Special Forces Tab.

Joe lives in El Paso with his wife Maria and two children, Diago and Marco. His son, Major Joe Lopez, Jr. was commissioned at UTA.

Donald J. Stevenson



Don was a member of the Fourth Army Rifle Team at ASC in 1965. He also served in various staff positions in the Corps of Cadets. In 1966 he received his BA degree in English and History. In 1973 he received his Law degree from SMU.

Don was commissioned Artillery and received his basic training at Fort Sill, OK. He was assigned as a forward observer with the 101st Airborne Division. He was wounded in action in Viet Nam, and after completion of his tour in RVN, was assigned to Fort Polk, LA, as Basic Training Company Commander. By this time he had reached the rank of Captain. He retired from active duty in 1970 and from the Army Reserve in 1972. Among his many awards and medals are the Bronze Star, the Purple Heart, the Master Jump badge, and the Distinguished Flying Cross.

As a Municipal Judge, Stevenson has served in Coppell and Dorthington Gardens. Since 1997 he has been the Chief Judge of the Municipal Court of Plano.

Don was a founding member and managing partner of his private law firm in Dallas. Don and his wife Ellen have two children, Marc and Andi.

Robert P. Vaughan, Sr.



Bob Vaughan enrolled in ASC in 1957. He was a member of the Sam Houston Rifles and Sergeant Major of the Corps of Cadets. He graduated in 1962.

After completing IOBC, Airborne School, Ranger School, and Flight School, Bob was assigned to the 11th Air Assault Division at Fort Benning. In 1966, Vaughn was sent to Viet Nam. Next, Vaughan was assigned to the U.S. Army Aviation Center at Fort Rucker, AL, as an academics and flight instructor.

In 1969, Vaughan returned to Southeast Asia for another combat tour of duty. He then transferred from Infantry Branch to Armor Branch. He was selected to attend the U.S. Army Command and General Staff College at Fort Leavenworth, KS. Vaughan earned his MBA from Webster University in St. Louis, MO.

Vaughan retired from the U.S. Army in February 1987 as a Lieutenant Colonel. He embarked on a new career as Planning Officer with the Governor's Division of Emergency Management under both Governor Ann Richards and Governor George W. Bush.

Bob, now retired, and his wife Jan live in Plano, Texas. He enjoys his fully restored 1957 Chevy.

One afternoon Jim Hunter asked me to meet him in the Student Center for a short conference. I thought it was about the Drill Team or something, but he asked me if my wife and I would

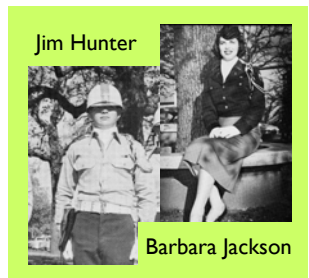

The Fall semester has been one of accomplishments for the Corp of Cadets. As many of you know, ROTC occupied in force 75 of the 80 bed spaces in the third floor of Trinity Hall. No, it's not a military academy environment, but you may not want to be around at 5:30 AM on Mondays, Wednesday, and Fridays, when the cadets are waking up for PT.

We have improved the Corps cohesion and sense of belonging. There are now 3 companies; our opening enrollment was around 170 cadets, a good 13 % increase over last year. There are some familiar positions like S5 (PAO) and S7 (Recruiting Coordinator), together they have been tasked to complete the yearbook, a tradition we want to reinstate. There is also a battalion honor captain, which will begin the Honor Code education process this semester. We hope to have a full cadet-administered and run Honor System up and running in 2 years. Finally, we re-instated the position of Company XO's, which together with the Company Commanders and Platoon

Leaders have taken a more prominent role in the leadership and development of the underclassmen.

Our cadets continue to excel. This past summer, our cadets achieved scores above cadet command averages in the APFT, BRM, Land Navigation, and percentages of "excellent" ratings at LDAC. We were one of only 2 schools out of 25 that accomplished this rating. The Ranger Challenge Team repeated bringing home the 2008 Brigade Ranger Challenge Competition Co-Ed 1st place trophy. Our brand new orienteering team took second place in a NTOA sanctioned competition last month. We had a record 4 nursing students accepted to upper division this past semester. We have cadets interested in reviving the rifle team, an expensive and time consuming task; and last but not least, a group of 3 seniors have taken the lead in the planning of a commemorative re-enactment of the 1960 famed March to Fort Hood.

We are excited and proud of the Corps traditions, and the Maverick Battalion continues in the lead for the "Pursuit of Excellence."
