## The Long March II

OK, guys line up! Now march 126 miles to Fort Hood, then go home.

Of course, that's the short version of the Long March. There are a few more elements to this mission. The plan was to replicate a 50-year-old legend established by a handful of ROTC cadets from Arlington State College way back in 1960. This is the 2010 version of the story.

There are some changes from a half-century before, yet there are some overlaps as well. A different time, a different perspective of men and women in uniform, a different war, and a different appreciation of just exactly what the sacrifices of the men and women in uniform bring to this country. The support staff, the cadre, the communications, the planning, the medical support, and the understanding that women have an equal role in today's military forces, were viewed differently 50 years ago.

In the '60s, Vietnam was on the front burner in the minds of the cadets. It would be only a matter of months until these young men would be leading troops into battle. Of the 16 original marchers, most would become Army officers, many would become highly decorated while they were in the service, four would be inducted into the UTA Military Hall of Honor, and three would be selected as UTA Distinguished Alumni. The university would change its name from Arlington State College to the University of Texas at Arlington. The leader of the original march was a tough young Cadre Army Captain named Will Latham. He had already been battle-hardened with a Silver Star and Purple Heart from Korea. Another marcher was the Corps of Cadets Commander Joel Ward. Both of these men began the first leg of the 2010 March, but this time they showed up with different credentials. Both were inducted into the UTA Military Hall of

• **Allan Garonzik**—Former Jody, Capt. Military Police, Member of the UTA Military Hall of Honor, UTA Distinguished Alumni, and completely lost without the others.

**The Genie Cooking Team** consisted of: Major Jeannie's husband, Major Will, and both sets of their parents—the Pantons and the Deakynes. The gourmet burgers and dogs were great, and the troops loved that meal.

**The Hay Valley Baptist Church Congregation** consisted of: every John Deere driver in South Texas, their wives, and their children and grandkids, and the most welcome Home Cookin' in a long time.

**The cooking teams** arrived in advance of the support teams, set up camp, and had hot food ready for the marchers. Breakfast was served at 0400 (4 a.m. for

**Military Science Department News:**

This was a year of great success for the 107<sup>th</sup> Maverick Battalion; 21 of 22 commissionees received their choice of Active Duty or Reserve/Guard, and 11 out of 12 received one of their first 3 choices of branch. **Cadet Robinson**, one of our three nurses, led the Battalion until he was commissioned in December. **Cadet McCaffrey** assumed command, and as well being the Marshall Award winner, he earned the distinction of being the number 14 cadet *in the nation*.

After 18 months of preparation, 49 cadets and 12 cadre participated in the Long March; nine completed the whole 126 miles. The support given by Bunky and his crew—cooking almost every breakfast and lunch for 5 days—was outstanding! Many thanks to the CCAC folks who contributed time and money.

We continue to position the Battalion for more success. New cadre arrivals include **CPT Ekeke** and **Ms.**

**Gomez** in logistics, and **Mr. Jones** as our Human Resource Assistant. The semester started with 179 cadets, the highest enrollment in the last 8 years, and of those, 168 remain. We have confirmed 17 scholarships for next fall, the majority from Texas, but also from St. Louis, Maryland, and even Chicago. Finally, we have 33 cadets attending LDAC this summer, 2 to airborne school, and 3 to Air-Assault school.

The CCAC Scholarship winners for 2010 are **Cadet Foley Ravello** and **Cadet Jeremy Potts**. The winner of the Preston A. Weathered award is **Cadet Jorge Lemus**.

We wish our recent grads great success and safety. They are truly a tremendous group of young people, volunteering to serve their country, even and especially during time of war.

Honor, and both were selected as Distinguished UTA Alumni. Ward was now Col. (R) Ward, retired Professor of Military Science at UTA, and Latham was now retired Major General Latham. At 82 years of age, General Latham still had his toughness—completing the first 26 miles of a 32-mile march on the first day.

Fast forward a half century. As mentioned, 2010 was much different than any time in the '60s. We still send our best and finest young women and men to protect freedom around the world, but a unified respect for our soldiers in uniform by the public, not prevalent since World War II, is apparent. Collectively, throughout the country, we are not all in agreement relating to our position in the Middle East, but the common ground appears to be the support of our troops. Our future leaders are trained and molded in universities throughout the country, and no finer soldiers can be found than those coming out of the University of Texas at Arlington.

While spring break is often mentioned in the same sentence as Cancun or Padre Island and all night parties, for these young soldiers from UTA, spring break will have a much longer-lasting and meaningful place in their memory. Time will tell if 50 years later these cadets will have excelled in their chosen careers and made their own mark. I would bet on the cadets.

It was agreed that there would be a separate support team of cadets. Some cadets would march the entire 126 miles, some would march half days, or different days. Others started, rested,

licked their wounds, and continued the march. The strain and pain from each day's march was obvious and expressed vividly on each soldier's face as they marched into camp each evening. Some were upbeat and jovial, and accepted that the pain simply came with the task at hand. Other cadets simply wanted the whole thing behind them, but onward they pushed to accomplish the mission. A few dedicated and qualified military nurses provided medical support and tended blisters and aches along the route. About half of the current Corps of Cadets participated in the 2010

march. The Professor of Military Science, Col. Alba, and his staff guided the troops; however, most of the planning and coordination was done by the cadets themselves. A host of army officers and NCO's assisted in the logistics, and a group of Cadet Corps alumni and a few friends provided most of the meals along the way. Maj. Deakyne's family provided one meal, and the Hay

Valley Baptist Church congregation in Turnersville hosted the final dinner before the last push into Fort Hood.

With few exceptions, the marchers were greeted with positive supporters along the route—in some cases a parade-like atmosphere. This was very uplifting to the weary soldiers, and helped encourage the troops to keep going.

Gen. Latham and Col. Ward, as well as all the support team and cadre, made the last part of the march into

the gates of Ft. Hood. A greeting by a general at Fort Hood, some press coverage, some family members, and supporters were on hand to welcome the troops after the long march. Campaign hats, buck knives, specially minted coins, and back packs were presented to the marchers. Special recognition went to the nine marchers who completed every step of the 126-mile march.

This paper may bubble to the surface sometime down the road, so I thought it appropriate to document some specifics of the Long March II. Time, dust, and memory have a way of making some of the details a bit fuzzy. Just ask Col. Ward if he really *volunteered* for that first march!

Notes:

**Day one** (March 13-Saturday), included a 32-mile march from Arlington to Keene, Texas. The marchers stayed at Chisholm Trail Academy, and set up cots inside the gym.

**Day two** (March 14-Sunday), a 25-mile march to Kimble Bend State Park. The marchers stayed in two-man tents.

**Day three** (March 15-Monday), a 31-mile march to Clifton, where the high school provided hot showers and the gym.

**Day four** (March 16-Tuesday), a 26-mile march to Turnersville, where arrangements were made to sleep in the National Guard Armory and the Baptist church provided the evening feast.

**Day five** (March 17-Wednesday), about a 12-mile final push to the north entrance of Fort Hood.
