2016 Military Science Hall of Honor Selections



LTC (Ret) Axel Martinez graduated from UTA in 1980. He was a member of the Corp and member of the Sam Houston Rifles for four years. He commanded the team in the 1978-1979 school year. He successfully completed the U.S. Army Airborne and Ranger schools in 1978 during his sophomore year in college. He

was commissioned in the Field Artillery, but after his first artillery assignment in Europe, he branch transferred to Army Aviation where he served with distinction as an army aviator for more than 15 years. LTC (R) Martinez also served a few years in information systems, including one tour in the Pentagon. He culminated his military career as a Foreign Area Officer, performing assignments as Inspector General at the Defense Language Institute and as the Chief, International Military Affairs Directorate, U.S. Army South with duty at Fort Buchanan, Puerto Rico, and Fort Sam Houston, Texas.

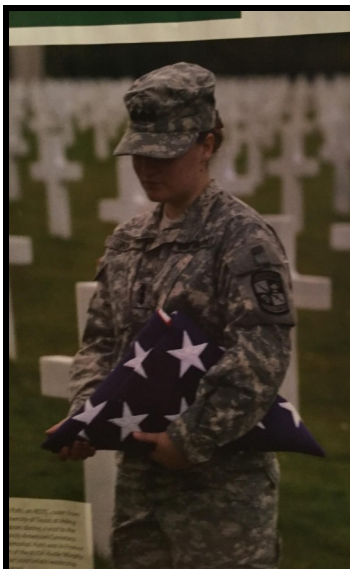
He retired in 2007 but was asked to rejoin his old office to serve as a political military analyst shortly after retirement. A year later he transitioned to the Civil Service to serve as the Civilian Program Manager for the U.S. Army Military Personnel Exchange Program (MPEP) and the School of Other Nations (SON) program in the Regional Affairs Directorate, U.S. Army South, Fort Sam Houston, Texas, where he presently continues to serve our nation proudly. LTC (Ret) Martinez lives on his ranch in Somerset, TX, with his wife Jill. They have three children and six grandchildren.



LTC (Ret) Ronald L. Munden graduated from the U.S. Military Academy in 1971 and was commissioned in the Field Artillery. He had a number of artillery assignments, including three battery commands, prior to being assigned to the UTA **Military Science Department** in the Spring of 1981. While at UTA

he was instrumental in building a number of programs and initiatives that have become integral parts of the Military Science Department and live on today. As Captain Munden, he researched, designed, produced, and procured a set of old flags used by the university and Military Science Department and further obtained historical uniforms that were used by the color guard. He acquired six 75mm Pack Howitzers that were used to form the **Carlisle Cannons**. Three of those cannons are still in use within the department. He also acquired the silver punch bowl and cups for used for ceremonial events and began the **Silver Cup** tradition. Active in the community and on campus, he finished his tour of duty at Arlington as the Corps of Cadets Commandant.

LTC Munden went on to have an illustrious career in the Field Artillery. After retirement he worked for a number of corporations in the area of military operations and training, counter terrorism training, testing, and evaluation. He retired in 2011 as a Senior Vice President for the Camber Corporation. He lives in Belton, TX, with his wife of 45 years, Lou Anne. They have two daughters and three grandchildren.

Run-To-The-Wall

UTA's Sam Houston Rifles featured at the 27th Annual Run to the Wall event in Dallas

The Texas Vietnam Veterans Memorial at Fair Park in Dallas pays honor to those Texans who served the United States in that hard-fought and heavily-debated conflict.

The Run to the Wall event started in 1988 when construction on the memorial began. Former President George H. Bush dedicated the memorial in 1989 at the 2nd annual Run-to-the-Wall event after construction was completed. Five tablets of Texas granite bear the names of Texans killed or missing in action in Vietnam, including nine Congressional Medal of Honor recipients. A soothing waterfall flows alongside the memorial, which is familiarly known simply as "The Wall."

Wreaths, bracelets, flowers, flags and other sentimental items are sometimes left next to the tablet bearing the name of a loved one.

In 2015 the UTA Sam Houston Rifles (the Jodies) performed for the second time at the memorial and made such an impression that the "Friends of the Texas Vietnam Memorial," who

are the keepers of the memorial, asked that the Jodies be invited back for the 2016 event. After the ceremony, veterans in attendance were asked to meet and greet the SHR team members. Comments were heard from veterans in attendance that they were glad to see American's future military leaders take pride in joining the military and serve their country as officers.

The annual Run to the Wall, now completed on motorcycles, includes veterans and supporters from all conflicts. It is not uncommon to see veterans from the Korean conflict to the current Middle East conflict in attendance to join fellow veterans in remembering those that "gave all."

During the State Fair, visitors place small American flags next to the names of veterans they know—or just to honor those who served and sacrificed in the name of freedom. You'll find the Vietnam War Veterans Memorial at the intersection of First and Parry Avenues, near the Automobile Building.

James Martin "Marty" Bower, 68, passed away Saturday, Feb. 14, 2015. Marty was born in Huntington, WV, on Feb. 16, 1946. He was a 1964 graduate of Arlington High School and a 1970 graduate of UT-Arlington, where he received his Army commission through the ROTC program. He was a Vietnam disabled veteran. For his service in the Army, he received the Silver Star, Bronze Star with V device-2, Meritorious Service Medal-2, Air Medal, Army Commendation Medal with V device, Army Achievement Medal, Purple Heart, National Defense Service Medal, Army Service Ribbon, Vietnam Service Medal-3, Vietnam Campaign Medal, Combat Infantryman Badge and Parachutist Badge.

Charles Klemme died Jan. 7, 2016 in Nashville, TN. He was a member of the Jodies in the late '50s, and an avid car enthusiast through out his life. He will be missed by all who knew him. Our sympathy goes out to his family.

Larry Carl Dubberly, Texas A&M Class of 1959, passed away recently and the ashes have been interred in a columbarium at the Dallas-Fort Worth National Cemetery. Larry was one of the members of the drill team that made a trip to the Junior Rose Bowl in 1957. He attended the freshman and sophomore engineering studies as ASC and received his degree from A&M.
